

Our school's fire risk and actions

Our school is a Category 4 School.

We will close on a day forecasted as a Catastrophic fire danger rating in the South West fire district.

All school bus routes that travel through a Catastrophic fire district will be cancelled.

How will you be advised

School closure for a Catastrophic fire danger day will be advised via <u>Compass</u>.

As much advance notice as possible will be provided to families based on the BOM forecast and messaging from the emergency sector.

Please be aware that the forecast will not be confirmed until closer to the day.

School preparations for the bushfire season

Each year, we undertake a range of activities to ensure the safety of our school and to prepare for bushfires and grassfires.

An important part of this process is communicating to parents what will happen when certain fire danger ratings are issued to help ensure the safety of students and staff.



Our school has been identified as being at risk of bushfire or grassfire and is a Category Category 4 school.

Our school will **close** on a day forecasted as **Catastrophic fire danger rating** in **South West fire district.**

Closure of the school due to a Catastrophic fire danger rating will be enacted when the Bureau of Meteorology forecast and related public safety messaging are confirmed. Due to uncertainties in the forecast, the timing of this confirmation may vary. Information regarding potential or confirmed Catastrophic fire danger days will be communicated to you by **Compass notification and email**.

It is also important to be aware that:

- No one will be on site on days where the school is closed due to a forecast Catastrophic day.
- All bus routes that travel through the Catastrophic area will be cancelled.
- School camps will be cancelled if a Catastrophic fire danger rating day is forecast for fire
 weather district in which the camp is located, or if the travel involves passing through areas
 that have Catastrophic fire danger.

As part of preparing our school for the fire season, we are updating our Emergency Management Plan and prioritising any maintenance works that may assist in preparing for the threat of fire.

What can families and the school community do to help us prepare?

- Ensure we have your current contact details, including your mobile phone numbers.
- Keep in touch with us by reading our newsletters, checking our website <u>www.apollobayp12.vic.edu.au</u> or contacting the general office with any questions about our Emergency Management Plan.
- Make sure your family's bushfire survival plan is up-to-date and includes alternative care arrangements if our school is closed due to Catastrophic fire danger. Further information can be found on the <u>CFA's website</u>.
- Action your family's bushfire survival plan if your own triggers are met. Our school community
 may be spread out across many areas and some families may be at higher risk than others.
 Your family's safety is critical, so please let us know if you are actioning your bushfire survival
 plan and if your children will be absent on these days.
- If your child is old enough, talk to <u>them about bushfires</u> and your family's bushfire survival plan.

Families are encouraged to action their <u>Bushfire Survival Plan</u> on Catastrophic fire danger rating days in their district. The safest option is to leave the night before or early on the morning of the Catastrophic day. **On such days, children should never be left at home alone or in the care of older children.**

Frequently Asked Questions

What is the department's policy?

The Department of Education annually assesses the fire risk of all schools and early childhood services with the support of the Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organisation (CSIRO). They are allocated a category of risk (categories 0 to 6). Schools and services that are Categories 0-3 are published on the <u>Bushfire At-Risk Register (BARR)</u>. Schools at some risk of bushfire and grassfire are published on the <u>Category 4 List</u>.

The department's <u>Bushfire and Grassfire Preparedness Policy</u> requires all schools and early childhood services on the BARR and the Category 4 List to close when a Catastrophic fire danger rating day is forecast in their fire weather district. All school bus routes which travel in or through a district with Catastrophic fire danger must also be cancelled.

The policy also requires that schools at the highest risk of bushfire (those in Categories 0, 1 and 2 of the Bushfire At-Risk Register) enact pre-emptive action plans based on the fire danger forecast for their Local Government Area (LGA).

Who issues fire danger forecasts?

The Bureau of Meteorology (BoM) provides public fire danger rating forecasts each day of the fire danger period using fire weather district areas. In Victoria, there are 9 fire weather districts, which are based on Local Government Area boundaries.

The department uses these forecasts when supporting schools to enact their pre-emptive bushfire actions plans.


Forecasts and general bushfire information






Understanding fire danger forecasts

- Fire danger ratings (FDRs) provide information about the potential level of danger should a bushfire start.
- FDRs are calculated by the Bureau of Meteorology (BoM) using a combination of weather forecasting and information about vegetation in the landscape that could fuel a fire.
- Victoria has 9 fire weather districts, which are based on municipal council boundaries. Our school is in the South West fire weather district.
- The BoM will publish the fire danger rating 4-day forecast on their website during the fire season, but these forecasts are subject to change.



Understanding fire risk and fire danger ratings

- The ratings provide information so that people can take action to protect themselves and others from the potentially dangerous impacts of bushfires.
- It is important, especially during the fire season, to stay up to date with conditions, monitor your surroundings and tune in to official sources for warnings.
- Since the 2022-23 fire season, Victoria uses the Australian Fire Danger Rating System which has 4 ratings; Moderate, High, Extreme and Catastrophic.



On **No Rating** days, no action is required because the risk of a dangerous fire is very low.

The Bushfire At-Risk Register and Category 4

The Department of Education worked with the CSIRO to develop the *Victorian Education Facilities Fire Risk Methodology,* which is used to assess the fire risk of all early childhood and school education facilities each year.

The Bushfire At-Risk Register (BARR)

The schools and facilities in Categories 0-3 are at the highest risk of being impacted by fire in the landscape and are included on the BARR. The BARR functions as a triaged risk register to support preparation for, and response to, the annual fire season.

Category 4

Schools and facilities that are at some risk of fire pre-emptively close in response to days of Catastrophic fire risk. These sites are at a lower level of risk than those on the BARR.

Our school is a Category 4 school.

Our fire risk and actions

Our school is a Category 4 School.

We will **close** on a day forecasted as a **Catastrophic** fire danger rating in the **South West** fire district.

All school bus routes that travel through a **Catastrophic** fire district will be cancelled.

How will you be advised?

- If our school needs to close on a Catastrophic fire danger day for Category 4, we will advise you via Compass.
- We will try to provide you with advance notice of possible Catastrophic days when we can. Please be aware that the forecast will not be confirmed until closer to the day.

Responding to the advice

- Our families play an important role in enacting our bushfire plans.
- Monitor your communications during the fire season to stay up to date. Follow the instructions provided by the school in these communications.
- Closure of the school due to a Catastrophic fire danger rating will be enacted when the BOM forecast and related public safety messaging are confirmed. Due to uncertainties in the forecast, the timing of this confirmation may vary.
- Find out more information on school closure and school bus service cancellations, including advice on re-opening is available from the <u>department's website</u>.

Fire in the landscape

- The school has an Emergency Management Plan. This plan accounts for a range of incidents including fires. If there is a fire in the landscape, we will initiate that plan, and seek advice from emergency services for the safest actions for the school.
- If our Emergency Management Plan is activated, we let you know via Compass.
- The Department of Education supports us to monitor warnings and weather conditions, and will work with emergency services to provide us with advice to keep our school safe.
- We may ask for you to collect your children. In other circumstances, we may ask that you do not collect your children, as this may place you and them in greater danger.
- All decisions will prioritise the safety of our students and will be informed by advice by the emergency services.

Preparing for the fire season





What can you do to prepare

- Make sure you understand the fire danger for our area.
- Review and update your family's bushfire survival plan, including how your child will be cared for when the school or childcare service is closed due to threat of fire. Your child should not be left unattended.
- Check that we have your current contact details, including mobile phone number.
- Keep in touch with us by reading our newsletters, checking emails and Compass, talking to your child's teacher and to others in our school community.
- **Understand** our Emergency Management Plan and your role in keeping the school, its students and staff safe.
- Talk to your child about bushfires and your family's bushfire survival plan.
- Talk to us including our principal, teachers or school council representatives
 if you have any concerns.

Make a bushfire plan

- The Country Fire Authority (CFA) provides great resources to support you and your family to plan ahead for the fire season.
- Remember that you don't have to live in the country to be at risk of fire.
- As a member of our school community, we recommend thinking about how you will plan ahead for the fire season.
- Taking steps to get prepared before the fire season means you know what to do when you're at risk of fire.

Frequently asked questions

If I'm concerned about the risk of fires, can I keep my child away from school, even if the school remains open?

Yes. If your family decides to enact its bushfire survival plan, the most appropriate place for your child may be with you and your family, and not at school.

Talk to us about your family's bushfire plan ahead of the fire season. You should also advise the school as soon as possible of your child's absence if your plan is enacted.

When will we be informed about Catastrophic fire danger day closures?

Fire danger forecasts are issued twice daily and can change with updated information. For the safety of our school community, the decision to enact our plan will depend on the latest BOM forecast and public messaging from the emergency sector.

We will confirm the decision as soon in advance as possible. Schools will also be provided with heads-up notices if it looks like a Catastrophic rating is possible.

Frequently asked questions

When the school is closed, will any staff remain on-site?

No. The safety of staff and students is our main priority, and no staff will remain on-site, and all other visitors and contractors will also not be allowed on site.

Is it possible that schools will be closed for consecutive days? If yes, how will parents be advised?

It is possible that our school will be closed for consecutive days. If this occurs, keep up to date via our communications on Compass.

We will be closed on all forecast Catastrophic days.
